

Topic:	Joseph in Egypt
Intro:	What is the strangest dream you can remember ever having? Do you think it had a meaning?
	In the Bible, dreams were sometimes how God spoke to people. There are only two stories in the Bible about people who were able to interpret the dreams of another person. Joseph was the first one.
	Joseph was sold as a slave in Egypt. His owner, Potiphar, liked him and promoted him to be in charge of his household. But Potiphar's wife got upset with him and decided to tell her husband that he had committed a crime which he hadn't. Joseph wound up being thrown in prison unfairly. How do you think this made Joseph feel? Would you still trust in God if after doing the right thing, you still got punished?

The three baskets are three days. Within three more days, Pharaoh will lift up your head from off you, and will hang you on a tree; and the birds will eat your flesh from off you." On the third day, which was Pharaoh's birthday, he made a feast for all his servants, and he lifted up the head of the chief cup bearer and the head of the chief baker among his servants. He restored the chief cup bearer to his position again, and he gave the cup into Pharaoh's hand; but he hanged the chief baker, as Joseph had interpreted to them. Yet the chief cup bearer didn't remember Joseph, but forgot him.

Court magicians had the job of performing spells, making potions and interpreting dreams. Wheat, fruits and vegetables were the main crops. Egyptians lived along two narrow strips of farmable land lining either side of the river Nile. Just beyond the farmlands were enormous deserts.</p> 

	<p>The king acknowledged that God had shown the meaning to Joseph. If Joseph had not been sold as a slave, would he be there to help? If he had not been thrown in jail, would he be there to help? Would God have been noticed by Pharaoh? Egypt was a big country with many people who would have starved if no one told them to prepare for seven years of famine. Why do you think God let Joseph suffer for so many years?</p>
	<p>What gifts did God give Joseph? (he could interpret dreams, he had wisdom to suggest a good plan to the king) Did Joseph use his gifts in a good way? (yes) How was Joseph rewarded for all his suffering? Did he get rewarded right away? How can we be patient when we are waiting for an unfair situation to get fixed?</p>
Closing:	<p>Show children charts with different pictures for five seconds each. Have them name the items in order after looking away for ten seconds. Did everyone get all of them right? (probably not) We all forget things. But God never forgets. He always remembers everything about our lives. Even when it seems like He may have forgotten us, He knows exactly how many hairs are on our heads (and that changes every day as new ones grow in and old ones fall out).</p>

Life in ancient Egypt was based on farming, and the growing season lasted eight to nine months. Wheat, fruits and vegetables were the main crops. Egyptians lived along two narrow strips of farmable land lining either side of the river **Nile**. Just beyond the farmlands were enormous deserts.
