

- Pronoun: a word that takes the place of a noun
- Subject pronoun: a word that takes the place of a noun that is used as the subject of the sentence
- you
- > she
- > he
- > it

- used after a verb
- Used after the words:
 - o as, to, with, in, out
- me
- you
- > him
- > her
- us
- > them

Pronoun-Antecedent Agreement

- The antecedent of a pronoun is the noun or nouns that the pronoun replaces
- The antecedent and pronoun must agree in number and gender



Antecedent

The word a pronoun replaces.

The boy was smart, even though he did not test well.

The students started running because they were late.

Jen ate her lunch quickly, because she wanted to get dessert.
