# Subject Pronouns

- Pronoun: a word that takes the place of a noun
- Subject pronoun: a word that takes the place of a noun that is used as the subject of the sentence
- I
  - we
- you
  - you
- she
  - they
- he
- it

# Object Pronouns

- used after a verb
- Used after the words:
  - as, to, with, in, out
- me
- you
- him
- her
- us
- them

When you use another name or pronoun before yourself and you're not sure if you should use I or me...

Just cover the first person to see which sounds best.

Tom and ? walk to school.



Tom and I walk to school.

Mom gave the book to Lisa and ?.

Mom gave the book to Lisa and me.



# Pronoun- Antecedent Agreement

- The antecedent of a pronoun is the noun or nouns that the pronoun replaces
- The antecedent and pronoun must agree in number and gender

# Antecedent

The word a pronoun replaces.

The **boy** was smart, even though **he** did not test well.



The **students** started running because **they** were late.



**Jen** ate her lunch quickly, because **she** wanted to get dessert.
