Yo-yos have been around since 500BC.

They may have been invented in Greece or the Philippines.

The yo-yo was the first toy to be brought onto a spaceship.

One appeal of the yo-yo is its name. The name yo-yo was first used in a Filipino dictionary in 1860. The repetition of a sound like this is called reduplication.

Here are some other examples of reduplication:

Writing Books

Writing has been used since 3,000 BC by the ancient Mesopotamians. The first book ever written (as far as historians know) is the Epic of Gilgamesh, from Sumer, around 2,000 BC. They used a form of writing called cuneiform that was made by pressing into a clay tablet. Press your pencil sideways to try copying these cuneiform marks:



The Egyptians developed a form of writing called hieroglyphics which they wrote on papyrus scrolls. Try tracing these hieroglyphs.



For centuries, books were written by hand. Johannes Gutenberg invented the printing press in Germany in 1440. The first book ever printed was a copy of the Bible. In 1801 Pellegrino Turri invented the first typewriter and in 1977 the first home computer was sold.

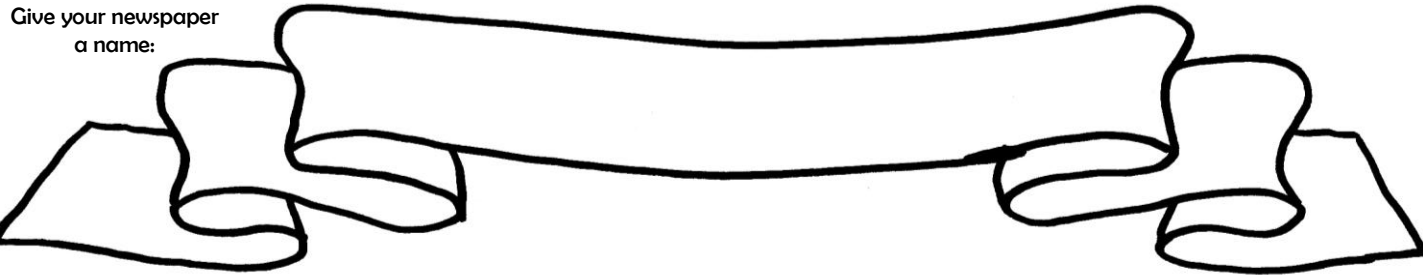


